Tip of the Month: Some great literacy activities developed for Music

Music Literacy activities are always hard to find. I have done a little searching and thinking and I have found some great ideas that are different from the usual Literacy Activities.

Literacy idea: Predicition

"Prediction" is an idea usually used in English. Students usually read part of a story and are then asked to predict the ending, or in Art they are given part of a picture and asked to predict the rest of it. Well, the same principle can be applied to music. Why not give the students a melody with some of the notes missing and ask them to predict which notes might go there, or perhaps play give them two bars and ask them to predict the remaining four. Another idea is to give them a cultural melody, like an African tune. Ask the students to predict the accompaniment based on their knowledge of that cultures music.

Literacy idea: Skimming and Scanning

"Skimming and Scanning" is again used with text but can still be used through music. You will need a written analysis of a piece of score and the actual score page. Start with the printed music and highlight any key words in the score. After you have a selected your key words, get the students to write these down in a list. Give them the written text analysis of the piece of music and ask them to use a skimming technique to **find the sentences** that contain the key words and highlight those sentences. The first one finished wins. The competition aspect gets them to skim quickly which is the idea.

Literacy idea: Recall

This is a great activity for "Recall". Again it is done with text but use a review about a song. All you need is:

- Song analysis with some missing information. (try to make it more than just key words that are missing.)
- The same song analysis with complete information. Cut it into 4 or 5 horizontal lines (ideally 2 or 3 sentences each). Tack them on different spots around the classroom behind the teacher's chair, on the wall, etc.

How to handle:

- Divide the class into pairs/groups and give each pair/group a copy of the Incomplete Song Analysis
- There is a writer and a runner (for the group, there is a writer and the rest are runners and take turns running.)
- The runner has to go to each of the spots in the room, one at a time, read that section of the analysis, remember it and recall it back to the writer.
- The writer listens carefully, asks for spelling of things if necessary and fills in the gaps. The first group finished correctly, wins.

- 6. Always have merchandise—a CD to sell or give as promotional material. You never know who will be at a live show.
- 7. Don't limit your marketing to the city you live in. Go global.....the internet makes it possible.
- 8. NEVER send unsolicited packages to music industry people or radio stations. Always contact first.
- 9. Go to many network events, gigs of other artists, music conferences to find out as much about the niche of the market you are trying to engage.
- 10. Make sure you pay your bills and sign your own cheques!!! Take control of your career.
